In 1967, Larry Fagin (a native of Far Rockaway) returned to his home city of New York. The decade prior had been nothing short of a world-class tour of avant-garde postwar poetry: Los Angeles with David Meltzer; Paris with Piero Heliczer, who introduced him to Allen Ginsberg, Gregory Corso, and Williams S. Burroughs; North Beach, San Francisco, with Jack Spicer, Robert Duncan, Philip Whalen, and Michael McClure; the Berkeley Poetry Conference with Robert Creeley and Charles Olson (as well as Anne Waldman and Lewis Warsh, who vowed to create Angel Hair thereafter). Yet New York and its poets felt like home. In 1968, his first book of poetry, *Parade of the Caterpillars* was published by Angel Hair Books at The Poetry Project in St. Mark's Church. In March of that same year, he published the first issue of his new magazine, *Adventures in Poetry*.

Borrowing the name from a textbook written for children titled Adventures in Reading, Fagin was, in his own words, reaching for "a kind of funky elegance like 0 to 9, a little fancier than 'C' or Lines" (From a Secret Location [FASL]). He ran it off on the nine-hole Gestetner mimeograph machine that The Poetry Project had purchased only a year before, in 1967–the same year (and venue) in which Fagin read his poetry in New York City for the first time (Insane Podium: A Short History). Print runs for each issue were between 300 and 350 copies, often collated at St. Mark's by friends. Between the covers of Fagin's magazine were poets whose works would become integral to the literary history of New York's Lower East Side: Ted Berrigan, Anne Waldman, Joe Ceravolo, James Schuyler, Dick Gallup, Ron Padgett, Johnny Stanton, Tom Clark, John Giorno, and others.

Fagin quickly followed this debut with a second issue dedicated entirely to prose in July of the same year, and would produce three more issues by 1970. By this time, he had stepped in as assistant to then-Director for The Poetry Project, Anne Waldman, and was a near-constant presence at the hundreds of readings hosted each year. At readings, if a poem or a poet sparked his interest, it was common to see him "rush to the podium and claim the manuscript for Adventures," and as he recalls, he was "rarely refused" (FASL).

In 1970, Adventures in Poetry took on larger publishing projects with poets Fagin felt were "completely off the radar screen" (FASL). Tom Veitch's My Father's Golden Eye was published as Adventures' first full-length collection, and John Ashbery's The New Spirit followed as its second. In subsequent years, Fagin's output soared, with Adventures releasing works by Jennifer Bartlett (her first book, Cleopatra I-IV), Clark Coolidge (The So), John Giorno (Cum, notable for its remarkable cover by Les Levine), John Godfrey (Twenty-Six Poems, with cover by Robert Indiana), and Ted Greenwald (Making a Living with cover by Gordon Matta-Clark). The imprint also published several collaborative books including Michael Brownstein and Ron Padgett's "Kiss My Ass" / Sufferin' Succotash (with cover and drawings by Joe Brainard), Henry Carey's Chrononhotonthologos (with an introduction by Ron Padgett and John Stanton), and the Book of Methods (For Getting Children Interested in Writing) co-authored by Fagin and Padgett. This teaching orientation was important: both Padgett and Fagin, along with others at The Poetry Project, such as Dick Gallup, were involved with several pedagogically-oriented programs throughout the 1970s, such as the Teachers & Writers Collaborative and Poets in the Schools program. Fagin held a lifelong interest in teaching, facilitating creative writing workshops and lessons until his passing in 2017.


Fagin's selection of cover artists for both books and magazine was just as

important as the poems within. Joe Brainard's distinctive illustrations were omnipresent, alongside work by Robert Indiana, Gordon Matta-Clark, Ed Ruscha, Michael Goldberg, Larry Rivers, George Schneeman, Jane Freilicher, Brice Marden, and even Edward Gorey, who provided the cover illustration for Richard Elliott's *A Song and Diary for A* in 1972–notably the same year that Gorey's own anthology, *Amphigorey*, was named as "One of the Five Noteworthy Art Books of 1972" by *The New York Times*. Though often beautiful, the covers were at times risqué. For the magazine's tenth issue, Fagin adorned the cover with a pornographic comic strip allegedly ripped from a Tijuana Bible and dubbed it the anonymous issue: no poets or illustrators were credited in an attempt to skirt censorship laws.

Throughout its seven-year run, Adventures in Poetry publications showcased both the poets and Fagin's editorial taste, published in volumes sometimes so thick that Fagin "purchased a state-of-the-art Novus stapler from Germany" so he could "cut through an issue like it was butter" (FASL). Though Fagin's rapid-paced publishing would continue until his final days, through other projects including Un Poco Loco and Sal Mimeo, as well as a later revival of Adventures in Poetry in 2001, the magazine's days were numbered by 1975. Times were changing: Fagin points to this year as the death of the downtown art scene, remembering a dinner party at Claes and Patty Oldenberg's house that year; when he and Peter Schjeldahl "got there, all anyone talked about was real estate...They'd all just bought lofts in what was later called SoHo. We left and I said to Peter, 'Well, that's the end of civilization,'" (The New York Times, September 7, 2011). In the summer of that year, Fagin published the final issue of the magazine. In 1976, he published the final four Adventures in Poetry volumes: Thazarbell Biggs' We Are Integrated and Wonderfully Made (the imprint's only unsolicited manuscript, written by a registered nurse), Rebecca Brown's For the 82nd Airborne, Blaise Cendrars' Kodak (translated by Ron Padgett), and John Godfrey's Music of the Curbs. "Money was becoming scarce," Fagin remembered, "I gave it a rest" (FASL).*

Fiercely original in concept, execution, and voice, Fagin eschewed editorial standards of the day, avoiding what he called the "grab bag mode" of most publications in favor of delivering deep dives into the work of poets whose voices he felt were urgent and adventurous (FASL). Along with Maureen Owen's *Telephone*, Anne Waldman and Lewis Warsh's *Angel Hair*, and Greg Masters, Gary Lenhart, and Michael Scholnick's *Mag City*, Larry Fagin's Adventures in Poetry stands as one of the defining publications of its time.

*Nevertheless, in 1985, Fagin briefly revived the imprint for his Naropa student, Ethie Stearns. The imprint was reinvigorated in the early 2000s with Christopher Mattison.

Editor Larry Fagin recalls "Number 10 was the 'anonymous' issue-no authors were credited; not even the name of the magazine appeared; the covers were pornographic comic strips. I couldn't pay the authors or cover artists, though once I commissioned Dick Gallup, who was in a slump, at \$5 per poem, and he came up with his wonderful 'Charged Particles' and several other beauties. Few legitimate publishers were taking on the kind of writing I like..." (FASL). This issue is scare and is only on record at four institutions across the country.
